Prostate Cancer Support



Marc Breton and Bill Horde attended a health fair at Alstom (Bombardier) on Feb 24th. Around 50 employees between the ages of 35 and 50 stopped by the booth to talk with us and get our pamphlet about reimbursement of the cost to get a PSA test.



## **Review of the Prostate Cancer Pathway at TBRHSC**

In the Spring of 2018, the local prostate cancer support group was invited by Cancer Care Ontario to recommend someone to participate in a review of the prostate cancer pathway at the Thunder Bay Regional Health Science Centre with the goal of identifying gaps in the process that could be addressed to improve the quality of care. Bill Everitt agreed to represent the group, becoming a Patient Family Advisor (PFA) at the hospital through its volunteer approval process.

The Prostate Health Steering Committee had representation from all areas of the medical community including urology, oncology, pathology, research, finance, imaging, funding, etc., as well as a Patient Family Advisor. The terms of reference for the committee stated that the term was for one year with quarterly meetings.

The Committee met twice that Spring and identified several areas of concern including the time that it took to go from the initial referral from a family doctor to actual treatment; the wait times to receive pathology reports; the high rate of infections following biopsies (up to 30%); the limited availability of MRIs in the diagnostic process; and the need for new equipment to meet current practice expectations.

A smaller group of urologists, oncologists, other representatives from the Cancer Centre and Cancer Care Ontario, as well as the PFA representative had an additional meeting to consider specific issues that patients experienced during the diagnostic process. From this session a workshop with the local prostate cancer support group supported a recommendation to establish a clinic where patients could see both a urologist and an oncologist in one visit rather that having several appointments, and recommended enabling members of the support group to act as peer counsellors at the proposed clinic.

While the Prostate Health Steering Committee has not met since 2018 there have been a number of significant improvements in the prostate cancer pathway locally. A new triage process at the urologists' office has reduced time from referral to diagnosis from 102 days to 64 days. MRIs are regularly used in the diagnostic process. Discussions have been held regarding a prostate clinic to reduce the number of visits required by patients. New equipment has been purchased and new procedures are being used including fusion biopsies, and laser surgery for urinary blockages in the urethra. Brachytherapy has been added as a treatment option through the cancer centre, eliminating the need to travel to southern Ontario for those who select this form of treatment.

So, much progress has been made over the past three years in the type and quality of treatment and care for men from Northwestern Ontario with prostate related issues.

Any man having prostate cancer is given a Gleason grade score by a pathologist.

In health care artificial intelligence (AI) algorithm is a field of study where computers do tasks which humans normally do.

Karolinska Institute, a Sweden-based medical university conducted a global AI competition with the aim of developing a reproducible AI algorithm for grading prostate cancer. For 3 months in 2020, 1290 developers from 65 countries participated in algorithm development using 10,616 digitized prostate biopsies

These submitted algorithms were evaluated by U.S. and European Union expert urology pathologists and both validation analyses showed that the algorithms achieved a high sensitivity for cancer detection.

Whether we like it or not, with increasing computational memory and speed AI will have a significant impact on healthcare. In urology, this impact will be mainly on accurate diagnosis, outcome prediction and planning treatments.

Those discoveries will not replace our pathologists, but will help improve cancer grading accuracy and reduce variability amongst pathologists. This will be good for men diagnosed with prostate cancer.


